After 24 years, the Portage Lake Association is still actively working to improve our community. Many volunteer hours go into putting on the events and activities you see around you throughout the year.



FROM THE VILLAGE

Great news...two grants were recently received by the Village to improve access to the beach area in the Village park and improve conditions at the boat launch.

The first received was a \$105,300 grant from the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund; this funding was approved by the State Legislature. A match of \$52,600 has been pledged which includes \$20,000 from the Village, \$20,000 in cash donations and \$12,500 in donated labor and materials. This grant was made possible by the combined efforts of the Explore the Shores Subcommittee of the Onekama Village and Township Community Parks and Recreation Committee, the Onekama Village Council and the Alliance for Economic Success. Becket and Raeder will be the design firm for the first phase of the park project will make the beach area universally accessible by installation of Peron steps, a barrier-free ramp and/or Mobi Mats to the beach. This phase also includes beach nourishment and signage to promote/encourage watershed awareness. The current plan is to start work this fall and have the improved village beach ready for the summer of 2014.

The second grant, submitted by the village, was received on June10 from the Manistee City Local Revenue Sharing Board in the amount of \$5,203. These funds will help pay for the extension of the village park boat launch and replace damaged concrete planks. The approximate cost of the work and materials for this project is expected to be \$12,000 and work should start shortly, making the boat launch will be available for use this summer.

We thank all those who worked towards making the receipt of these grants a reality!

Just in time for all the events that are scheduled throughout the summer months -the water well at the Farr Center has been replaced and is in good working order!!

Important information for gardeners....Are the birds, butterflies and bees as numerous in your garden as they were in previous years? The problem could be invasive plant. Invasive plants are harmful to our natural habitat...they crowed out those plants that are native to our area and attract those birds, butterflies and bees to our gardens. Many plants we have been planting in our gardens over the years are invasive.

Below is a list of some plants to avoid planting.

Honeysuckle, Japanese barberry, buckthorn, callery pear lyme grass. ribbon grass. oriental bittersweet, Japanese honeysuckle, periwinkle/myrtle, snow on the mountain, lily of the valley. moneywort, wintercreeper. sweet woodruff, water hyacinth. water lettuce and parrot feather.

Some of the "Good to Grow" plants are:

pearly everlasting, foxglove beardtongue, Jacob's ladder, bush honeysuckle, ninebark. nannyberry, northern spice bush, Allegheny serviceberry, chokecherry, little bluestem, switchgrass, prairie dropseed, trumpet vine, trumpet and red honeysuckle, bearberry, wintergreen,

Christmas fern, bluebead lily, sheep laurel, creeping snowberry, bunchberry dogwood, pickerelweed, water smartweed and bottle brush sedge.

WORKSHOPS

So Your Kids are Playing Soccer....

Are your kids signed up for soccer, and you don't have a clue about the game? Here's a quick introduction to the game, how the rules are different for specific age groups and what you can expect as a parent or a coach. Roger and Leann Burger, coaches and referees for more than 23 years, will explain everything from that tricky offside rule to equipment your child needs to get started. \$5 for one or both parents or guardians.

Quilt Class

Skill Level- Beginner and above

Project- Throw size Tossed Nine Patch Quilt (approximately 55x64)

Three class sessions: Wednesdays, October 16, 23, & 30, 6pm until 8pm

COST \$ 35 plus materials

Class members will make a quilt top during our three week class. The following skills will be covered in our sessions: learn to use a rotary cutter and mat, make accurate ¼ inch seams, use strip piecing methods, use chain piecing methods, proper pressing techniques, join completed blocks into rows and join rows together. We will learn to add borders, make pieced borders and learn to bind a completed quilt. We will not be quilting our project in class.

Fall Table runner class

Skill Level- Beginner and above

Project- Seasonal Table Runner 43 x 20

Two Class sessions: Saturday, October 12th & 15th, 9:30 am - 12 Noon

Cost: \$20 plus supplies

Class members will use a rotary cutter and mat, piece blocks and join them to make a table runner. We will learn to prepare the backing, batting and quilt top and quilt it on our machines using a walking foot. Preparing binding and attaching it will be demonstrated.

TICK ALERT:

Over 20 known species of tics are in MI. If you find a tic on your body, pull it straight out with fine tipped tweezers and put it in a tight lidded container- it should be alive for the testing. Take it to the Health Dept. at 385 3rd St. in Manistee. The state lab in Lansing will test it for species identification and disease. This lab work is done at no charge for MI residents. Onekama Building Supply (the hardware store) carries Permethrin, which is to be sprayed on a set of clothing and will keep tics away for up to 6 washings of those clothes. Tics carry Lyme disease, Rocky Mountain spotted fever and many other bacterial and viral conditions. Most require treatment with antibiotics, and the sooner the better to prevent long term complications.

DATE SET FOR ANNUAL FUNDRAISER

The Portage Lake Watershed Forever (PLWF) Annual Cocktail Party will be held on Saturday, July 27, from 5:00 until 7:00 at the Bernard Family compound on Ardmore Road on the north side of Portage Lake.

This year will feature brief remarks by Portage Lake's Lake Management Environmental Scientist, Bre Grabil. As questions usually abound about the state of the lake, this event will give attendees a chance to get accurate and current information.

The party, however, is never all work and no play. Each year for the past six summers, the event has brought friends together to enjoy fine food and wine in their support of the Watershed's



Annual Fund. This fund helps to defray costs associated with ongoing work of the organization.

Invasive Species Committee Report


The first 2013 survey of the lake was conducted by Professional Lake Management on June 4th.

In addition to doing the usual Aquatic Vegetation Assessment Site survey, they also used a Lowrance sonar and side imaging structure scanning depth finder. This is the same equipment that was donated by the watershed for use by volunteers throughout the summer.

All the data will be sent to a bio-base technology company to be updated and compiled into precise, current maps of underwater invasive weed colonies. These will not only serve as treatment maps, but will become a permanent record to confirm effectiveness of areas treated, growth statistics, identify new areas of infestation for future treatment, and maintain a year by year effectiveness profile of Eurasion water milfoil treatment. With this new state of the art technology and the increased number of surveys that will be done by volunteers throughout the summer, we will have excellent data on the aquatic vegetation in our lake this summer.

The purple loosestrife was treated using a biological control in late May and the phragmites treatment will be done in September.

Watch for the Portage Lake Newsletter that will be included in your winter tax notice for the 2014 Tentative Treatment and Survey Schedule. An extensive State of the Lake Report will be available later this summer.
