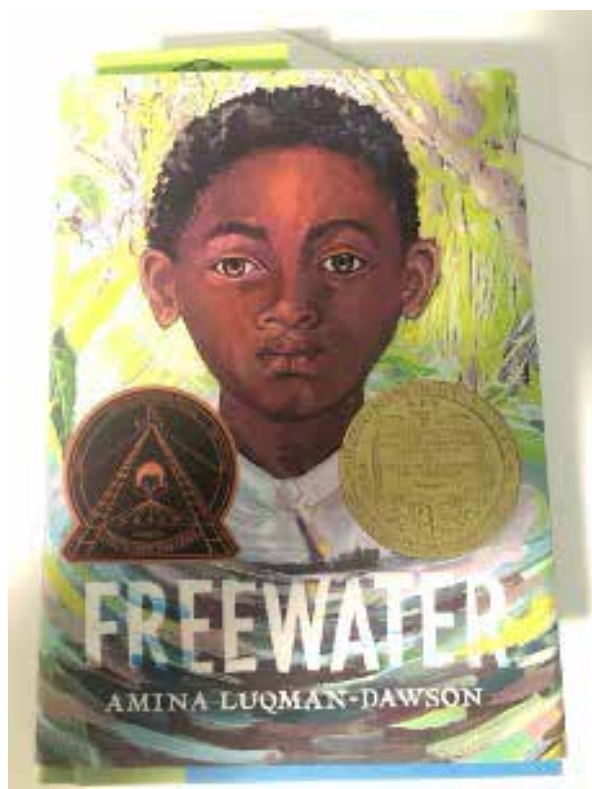

Onekama Reads

Near & Farr Friends is debuting a new community event this spring which we hope will become an annual tradition over time. We are inviting community members from ages 13 to 103 to participate in a community reading and discussion we are calling “Onekama Reads.” Introduced by Bonnie Garbrecht at a fall gathering, the concept is for all participants to read the same book and then gather for a robust discussion.

The book selected for our first read is Amina Luqman-Dawson’s Newberry Award winning adolescent novel, *Freewater*. Those interested in participating should get their hands on the book through the library or at a book store and read the compelling story in April.

The discussion led by Bonnie, an avid reader and former community college English teacher, will take place at the Onekama Township Hall at 2:30 pm on Thursday, May 2.

Freewater, tells the intriguing story of two escaped slave children — 12 year old, Homer, and his 7 year old sister, Ada, who make their way to freedom in the Great Dismal Swamp country on the outer shores of Virginia and North Carolina. Though the story is fiction, it is based on careful research by Luqman-Dawson.

“While many people know about the Underground Railroad, this is a part of our history that I personally knew nothing about prior to reading this book,” says Garbrecht. “According to records, thousands of escaped slaves lived in such communities between 1700-1860.”

Check out the Kaleva Art Gallery

The little town of Kaleva is host to the Post Office, the Three Sisters Tavern, the Sculpture Walkway, the Historic Bottle House Museum and the KALEVA ART GALLERY. Boasting over 35 makers these days, the Gallery is well worth your stop. Clever and beautiful hand-crafted items fill the space, and a gift or a personal treat are easily found.

The Gallery was established in 1997 by student artists and their teacher to showcase their work, and together they formed an art co-op. Co-ops exist to create value for their members and their communities, and The Kaleva Art Gallery does credit to that mission.

The Artist members donate their time to work 4 hours a month, and have a great opportunity to showcase their goods in and for the community. When you stop by you are sure to be talking to someone who has their work on display. There are quilt and fiber artists, knitters and crocheters, painters, potters, woodworkers, glassworkers, and the list goes on. Back in the corner lives a second chance area where folks can find materials to try a new craft or pick up a deal on fabric ends...there is always something interesting!

The Artist members of the Kaleva Art Gallery also like to think up events to share their talents and pleasure in creating with anyone who’d like to try something new. There have been papermaking workshops, book signings, planter contests and Christmas ornament workshops. Coming up in March, St. Urho’s day will be celebrated with a bake sale, and April will host a beaded flowers workshop, a 3-yard quilt class and a fused glass jewelry class to make something for your Mom.

Please stop in, put your name on a sign-up sheet for a class, and browse our collection. You will find something you’ll treasure!

The more people prepared to offer assistance and stay with the victim until EMTs and ambulance arrive, the greater the chances of a positive outcome. 911 staff keep the caller on the line asking questions and guiding the caller through the steps needed to be taken until emergency crews arrive. You can add to our community of informed adults by signing onto the Red Cross website and following these steps:

- Select Adult First Aid / CPR / AED Online Only
- Select Sign me up

Adult First Aid / CPR / AED has a course fee of \$37 (payable with a credit card). The fee can be reimbursed upon completion of the course.

Near and Farr Friends is a program of the Portage Lake Association (PLA), a group of volunteers who are dedicated to making the Onekama area a great place in which to live, play and stay.

SOMETIMES PETUNIAS ARE NOT THE BEST SOLUTION

After the early drought in May and June last year, the Petunia Parade Committee began to think about some areas where petunias just do not grow well. The most obvious area is at the corner of Main and 1st Avenue, directly in front of Rotary Park. Issues seem to be too much shade, no one living there to augment the daily watering, and an incredible amount of equisetum growing along that strip of soil. The petunias are spindly, sparse, and sad.

So, an experiment is underway. Last fall, the committee decided to try the hardy plant called Iberis (aka “candy-tuft”). They found a varietal called ‘Autumn Beauty’ which is unusual for its promised blooming in both spring and late fall. Nine plants were purchased, the soil was augmented, and the transplants were put into the ground in October. Only the very short strip of land between the western-most telephone pole and the corner are part of this experiment. The remainder will be planted with petunias this year.

By early December, the plants had taken root well and were beginning to spread. The “runt” on the corner needed some special protection from the elements, so it is surrounded by a short wire cage. Our committee member Val Clements watches over them and alerts us to any potential mishaps.

Imagine our surprise in mid-February when we happened to see one plant already in bloom! See the photo of the plant which has spread and blossomed with tiny white flowers. With the weather this year, we are not sure if this is early spring or late fall for it!

If this is successful, the Committee might extend them to the eastern part of that plot. According to Bluestone Perennials, Iberis is prized for its evergreen foliage and makes an attractive appearance all season. White flowers in spring play well with others and enliven an evening garden as their crisp white blossoms will reflect the moonlight.



News from Portage Lake Watershed Forever

Why is a natural shoreline important for our lake? The shallow waters near the shore can provide habitat that is essential for the life cycles of fish and wildlife. Over the years, seawalls and riprap have reduced the natural shoreline habitat that is important for fish, wildlife, and the filtering of pollutant runoff. A 2019 drone survey of the Portage Lake Shoreline found that of the 385 waterfront parcels surveyed, only 11% had natural shorelines, while 44% had a seawall and 29 % had riprap. These findings have been substantiated in the 2023 report from the Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP), Score the Shore Habitat Assessment, which ranks Portage Lake slightly below average among the 97 Michigan lakes included in the study. The report states, “all of the habitat ranges from slightly to moderately degraded, depending where in the lake one is looking. There are some sections that are quite healthy and natural, and others where there is not much natural habitat remaining.”

However, today’s technology and infrastructure provide available and achievable opportunities to “restore the shore” and combat these negative impacts. For example, Portage Lake Watershed Forever has purchased several wetland parcels on the north side of the lake to create the Cedar Grove Wetland Preserve. Preserving this wetland, which has a hydrological connection to the lake, will help protect the lake’s water quality and preserve habitat important to fish and other wildlife. This year PLWF will embark on a new project to create a public walking trail through these wetlands.

Lakefront property owners can also help preserve and restore a more resilient, natural shoreline, often just by making small changes, such as preserving a natural buffer of native trees, plants, or grasses along the shoreline. Check out the Michigan Natural Shorelines Partnership Shorelines Stewards program to help you assess your shoreline and what you could do to improve it. As their website points out, “Not everyone can do everything, but everyone can do something.”

Recycling

Public Act 69 allows Michigan Counties and local units of government to enter into an agreement to fund a residential recycling program. Nine of Manistee County’s communities, including Onekama Township/Village use Public Act 69 to fund their local recycling programs and are collectively known as the PA69 Recycling Program. The recycling sites located in six communities are paid for and are for use by residents of the PA69 Recycling Program communities only. View the PA69 Recycling Guidelines to see what is recyclable in these communities.

All Manistee County residents have access to the recycling drop-off site located at the Republic Services Manistee County Landfill at 3890 Camp Road, Manistee.

UPDATE ONE NEW EVENT STAGE

The Portage Lake Association is excited about this summer. Thanks go to OCR (Onekama Collaborative Recovery) for leading the effort to install a new event stage in Onekama Village Park. This project would not have been possible without the support and input of the Onekama Village Council and assistance from the Manistee County Community Foundation (MCCF), as well as area businesses, organizations, and individuals.

The stage is expected to be in place just in time for the PLA's popular Monday Night Concerts in the Park, which begin July 1st. If all goes as planned, a ribbon cutting and afternoon of music will be held Sun., June 23 to kick off the season and celebrate the new addition to the park.

After a year of planning, the new stage will be a beautifully designed, permanent, covered structure in the park's northeast corner. The new location will allow the beautiful sunsets to occur behind the audience instead of in their eyes.

In a September 2023 press release, OCR shared its plans for Onekama Village Park improvements, adding that they are subject to change. The release stated that Phase I would include the construction and installation of the stage. The plan for Phase II would involve renovating or completely rebuilding the existing pavilion.

“In May (2023), the Onekama Village Council approved a plan for OCR to take the lead on Phase I of a multi-phased improvement plan for Onekama Village Park without impacting Village resident taxes,” the release stated. “Funding is to come primarily from grants and private donations.”

Phase II has been approved by the Village Council, with the construction of a new main pavilion scheduled for May 2025. Fundraising for Phase II will start in June 2024.

Donations, made by check or online, are held in a Onekama Village Park Improvement Fund administered by MCCF, a charitable organization.
